Dear Friend of Angelus Academy,

Nurturing a lifelong love of and devotion to the Holy Eucharist has always begun with our youngest students and continues in earnest long after their First Communion. This is critical—not only for our students, but for the Church, as many Catholics today do not believe in the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the Blessed Sacrament.

In our Atrium, our Little Messengers (three- and four-year-old students) through second graders begin to develop a personal relationship with Jesus the Good Shepherd, learn of His great sacrifice, and become familiar with the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Weekly school Mass in our Chapel of the Holy Angels gives students the opportunity to see the Holy Sacrifice more closely. Our monthly Eucharistic Adoration allows students to spend time with the "Hidden Jesus" in both silent and spoken prayer. Indeed, our kindergarteners provide beautiful examples of talking lovingly with Jesus during their time in Adoration!

In our ardent efforts to teach our students to know and always seek the true, the good, and the beautiful, it is vital that we help support school families in keeping Jesus and the Holy Eucharist at the center of their lives. When our students' school day remains anchored in the Blessed Sacrament through catechesis, history, literature, Mass, and Adoration, our students will more surely and firmly stay rooted in the Truth.

As an independent Catholic school, we receive no financial support from the Diocese of Arlington. My husband, Steve, and I are convinced that it was our Blessed Mother and the angels, with one final nudge from Saints Philip and Nathanael, who ultimately led us to the doorsteps of Angelus Academy in November 2021. We had grown increasingly dissatisfied with the lack of rigor in the Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS). Seasoned teachers from the "old way" were retiring or being pushed out by more progressive school administrators. Our family had continued to

grow, so we still had little ones who were starting to experience the change in teaching philosophies.

All the while, I had been experiencing a deep reversion to my Catholic faith, and Steve had converted. He was confirmed and our marriage was convalidated during the same Mass in 2019. It was years in the making, but

we now wanted to go another step further and embrace Catholic education as part of our family culture. Early on, we had felt like FCPS needed our children to be the light in the darkness, but as the ideologies got further from truth, we desired more support.

We spoke to a priest-friend about our decision to make the leap to Catholic school. Where should we go? He replied, "Angelus Academy." I had heard of Angelus and understood it to be "tiny" and "very Catholic." For years, I can honestly say that neither Steve nor I felt "spiritually ready" for such a school. We just couldn't "hang" with "those kinds of Catholics." This priest never let up. He would hear us complain about FCPS and then simply respond with, "Angelus Academy!" When FCPS decided to remain closed for the fall of 2020, we went against our priest-friend's recommendation and enrolled our children in a different Catholic school. We thought that a larger school would be beneficial. It was anything but that. The school community seemed gripped by fear and lacking in their trust in God as they implemented COVIDrelated protocols.

one day, however, the Lord brought many disjointed pieces of information together for me. I recalled a slide from the Backto-School Night presentation boasting a social-emotional learning (SEL) curriculum being used at the school. I realized that this was the exact same SEL program

used by Loudoun County Public Schools. I asked the Lord what to do next. He told me to read about the program.

I subsequently discovered that funding for this SEL program came from nefarious groups that promote ideologies strictly against the teachings of the Church, such as transgender ideology and abortion. Surely, the school simply did not know what they had gotten themselves into by using this program. Unfortunately, a meeting with the administration a month later yielded no change. Steve and I both agreed that we needed to find a new school for our children immediately.

Steve and I also felt like we had discovered an evil dragon but could only see its toenail. The beast was too big for us to battle on our own. We were further down the road of knowledge than most. Rather than continuing to fight for other families unaware of all that I had discovered, we first needed to care for and protect our own family. I was frantic. My children's innocence was at stake. I then remembered our priest-friend's repeated advice: "Angelus Academy!"

Mrs. Sheila Bruen answered my frantic phone call the next day. She assured me that none of that same "funny business" goes on at the school, it's a very low-tech environment where books are everywhere, and kids play for hours in an imaginary playground called the parking lot. She told me that **this was a place where "children stay children" longer because the school protects their innocence.** I cried my way through our conversation. She then invited me to come for a visit.

I arrived at the school as it was opening for the day to meet with Mrs. BettyJo Lash and have a tour. I was nervous to go inside. The school is in an industrial park, for Heaven's sake, and there is no campus to speak of. What was I doing?! As I was walking up the side of the building, I heard Saints Philip and Nathanael. St. Nathanael joked to me, "Can *anything* good come from Nazareth?!" St. Philip seemed to be on my other side; he smiled and said, "Come and see."

I then walked into the school lobby and immediately felt the Holy Spirit's presence.

There was peace and sunlight. It smelled like a school. Children were happy. They greeted me cheerfully as I waited in the lobby. They were physically close to each other. Their friendship was evident. I sensed more love than fear. *This* was exactly the kind of school I wanted for my children!

I finally had to admit that through prayer, study, and consecration to Mary, I had become one of "those kinds of Catholics" and wanted to "hang" with the likes of them. This is a school where faith and reason are intertwined beautifully in every decision made, no matter how big or small. Mother Mary protects our children and the mission. Angelus is helping Steve and me to raise saints (rascally ones, though they may be). Steve and I always tell our children that our rally point is Heaven. The faculty, staff, and families are all working toward that goal...Heaven!

This is only the beginning of my family's story at Angelus Academy. How Steve came to be the second-grade teacher is one for another time. It's steeped in Eucharistic miracles, spiritual attack, suffering, redemption all of that. God has a plan for all of us, and sometimes, He gives us the grace to see how it all fits together—and how it was years in the making.
